FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC



As we approach the end of Term Two, our latest Newsletter will hopefully give you, the parents, family and friends of BSAK students, the chance to see what has taken place so far in 2019.

As ever it has been a hugely busy term, but an incredibly enjoyable one with a number of significant highlights. Since our return in January the students have been tirelessly practising individually and rehearsing in countless ensembles in preparation for exams, concerts and competitions; the entire school has been alive with the sound of Music!

As always, Young Musicians of the Gulf was a real highlight for those students fortunate enough to participate. The standard of performance across the 4 days of competition is absolutely mind-blowing and it really is a superb annual event, hosted by St Christopher's, Bahrain. With all competitions there have to be winners and losers, coupled with some controversial adjudications and the 2019 competition certainly had it all!

Our congratulations to all our musicians who competed and who were such fantastic ambassadors for the school.

Particular mention should go to our amazing Guitar Trio (William, Saleh and Christian) who won the Duets and Trios prize, and again to William who retained his Guitar Prize!

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Our Primary Choir have continued to excel themselves and their performance at this year's ChoirFest competition was absolutely fantastic, gaining praise from the judges and fellow competitors alike.

Teachers from other schools also commented that they were 'head and shoulders' above other groups but alas we were unfortunately not invited to take part in the latter stages of the competition. Instead the choir were once again invited to sing at the BSME Head's Conference in Yas and gave a rousing performance of Gary Barlow's 'Sing' to a very appreciative audience of Head teachers from across the Middle East on 20 March.



This term's Musicians' Showcase was a truly memorable evening. 'Beautiful', 'professional', 'incredible' were just three of the adjectives used to describe the concert. The audience were treated to 14 exceptional solo performances from secondary students highlighting the breadth of music-making taking place in the department. The programme included a baroque vocal aria, movements from baroque suites, concerti, romantic piano music, jazz, all the way through to recent musical theatre productions from Wicked and The Waitress.



The recent visit by BSO Inspectors coincided with more 'Outstanding' musical events: a series of early morning pop-up concerts featuring a number of soloists and ensembles which were all superb and the annual Flute, Recorder and Guitar Concert - not forgetting the Ukuleles too! Just shy of 100 students took to the stage for this memorable event. Remarkably, at the same time as the concert was taking place, there were also 'normal' weekly rehearsals going on for other ensembles elsewhere in school - Chamber Orchestra, Senior Strings, Concert Band and Senior Orchestra to name but a few!





As part of our role as a Community School, we continue to focus on giving opportunities to the wider Abu Dhabi community and none more so than this term. Our first recital at Louvre Abu Dhabi took place on 7 March enabling visitors to the Museum to experience first-hand the high quality of musicianship taking place at BSAK.

Despite a couple of technical glitches and tricky climatic conditions, our instrumentalists put on a superb display of virtuosity. The second recital on 21 March was simply stunning and the feedback from the participants, parents and the organisers was incredibly positive. We hope there will be more opportunities of this nature in the near future.

Our Community Brass Day was another *tour de force*, attracting over 50 brass players from across the UAE. Led by the Bavarian Camels, a professional Dubai-based Brass quintet, the students, ranging from beginners all the way up to Grade 8+ players, prepared a range of pieces throughout the day before giving a wonderful recital to parents and friends. The sound produced was nothing short of miraculous given not only the number of players, but the range of abilities.




On Friday 15 March, we also welcomed the Omer String Quartet to give a number of master classes and coaching sessions to young string players. Over 35 string players had the opportunity to have individual 'lessons' with members of the quartet; the engagement and interaction was truly inspirational.



As ever, we continue to strive to give as many opportunities to our musicians as possible, regardless of age and experience. Our regular Beginners' Concerts are a true example of this, featuring students who are just embarking on their musical journeys. Invariably around 40 young instrumentalists or singers will perform in front of a small, yet hugely supportive audience, and they really are special events. As we celebrate the success of our elite musicians, we also should remember that they too were once beginners, only able to play 3, 4 or 5 notes!




Over the past year or two, we have been actively trying to give our rock n pop singers more opportunities to gain recognition and exposure for their outstanding talents. The recent Unplugged Concert was a tremendous success, showcasing the breadth of styles and artists that our singers enjoy so much. Accompanied by a live staff band, it is an incredible experience for them and consequently this event continues to grow in popularity!



Towards the end of term we welcomed Paul Phoenix to share his expertise, knowledge and skills with us. After starting out as a chorister at St Paul's Cathedral in London, Paul was later members of the King's Singers, with whom he performed at most of the major concert halls around the world, giving 120 concerts per year. Most recently he has set up his own company 'Purple Vocals: Perform and Engage' and through this he has been engaging with our choirs, music classes and scholars to pass on the skills that he has learnt from 20 years as a professional singer, as well as giving an unforgettable recital to a hugely appreciative audience.

I would like to take this opportunity to pay tribute to the fabulous academic and instrumental staff who work so incredibly hard to ensure that each and every student's musical experience is a positive and enjoyable one. The range of musical opportunities available to BSAK students genuinely is second to none and I have every confidence that we will continue to improve, diversify and adapt in order to remain one of the best schools for music in the region.




DATES FOR YOUR DIARY

INTERVIEW WITH MRS DALLAS



Why did you become a Music teacher?

I always knew I wanted to be a teacher from a very young age but I had no idea that I would end up being a Music teacher!

I am actually a qualified Primary school teacher but I have a Music Degree so am able to teach Music as a specialist subject. I started teaching Music for the first time ever here at BSAK. I began as the Infant music teacher back in 2001 and later moved up into the Junior school. I'm now teaching Music in the secondary school, which means I have taught every year group from Nursery through to Year 13, and I am very grateful to have been offered that breadth of experience. I love my job, I don't have very many other talents so I am very happy to be doing something that I love so much as my profession.

What qualifications do you need to be a Music teacher?

To become a teacher you must have a degree and a teaching qualification. I have a BA hons Degree in Music and a Postgraduate Certificate in Education (PGCE). I later went on to gain my Masters in Education, but this is not a specific requirement to teach, I just did this for fun! Obviously the job requires a pretty good understanding of Music?

although there are no specific requirements to be able to play to a certain standard. I play the piano on a daily basis, which is not my first study instrument, but it is definitely useful to be able to find your way around a piano in my job!

What do you love most about your job?

I love the variety my job brings. Every day I find myself doing something amazing, something crazy or something totally memorable. Yesterday I was outside on the pitch rehearsing our house song at 7.30am, today I am teaching Year 9 jazz whilst dressed as Minnie the Minx, this afternoon we are performing at The Louvre and next week I am playing at the Special Olympics. There aren't many people who get to experience stuff like that in their jobs. It is so important that you find yourself a job that you love, a job where you get up in the morning and really want to go to work, a profession that makes you happy. It's not always about the money, it's also about your own mental well being.

Who are your favourite musicians?

There are so many! I love Stevie Wonder, Jools Holland, Jamiroquai, Beyonce, Debussy. I am a big jazz fan, there is nothing quite like the sound of a big band. Jools Holland is an amazing performer, if you have never seen him perform live then you should try and get to one of his concerts, he is brilliant to watch. Choosing music to listen to really depends on my mood, if I'm getting ready to go out then I will choose something loud and funky with a strong bass line so that I can dance around my bedroom! If I'm exercising then I would choose something fast and furious like techno as the strong beat and repetitiveness keeps me moving. But then there are times when listening to classical music is the perfect way to wind down at the end of a busy day. If I am in the car then I am usually forced to listen to whatever my kids want to listen to!

How many instruments do you play?

I play the cello, the clarinet, the piano and I really enjoy singing. I regularly perform with UAENSO and I also sing in a swing trio called The Desert Roses. Of course when I was younger there were times when I didn't want to practise and there were times when I thought it wasn't very cool to be a musician and I wanted to give up many times, but my mum always managed to keep me going. My parents spent hours driving me to rehearsals and they must have sat through hours and hours of concerts and performances. They invested a lot of time and money in it all so I am extremely grateful to them for supporting me like they did because without their help I don't know what I'd be doing today.

What are your other passions? My family, keeping fit and eating!

Why do you think students should learn a musical instrument?

There are so many benefits to learning a musical instrument. whether it's building your confidence, enhancing your memory, widening your social circle or simply used as a stress buster. It is important to mention that universities hold music in high regard, even if you are applying to study Science or Maths, if they see Music on your application you can guarantee they will want to talk to you about it in your interview. It is important to show that you are a well rounded student who can bring something more to the university.

I am not a natural musician, I had to work incredibly hard to pass my music grades and to become the musician I am today, and I still work hard at it even now. Whilst natural talent is a wonderful gift, absolutely anyone can be taught and everyone can learn given the right opportunities. Remember - "If you can talk you can sing, If you can walk you can dance".



This was followed by our fabulous Piano Concert, where pupils of all ages performed pieces from beginner all the way to Diploma level.



String Day with the Omer Quartet Master classes and Ensemble coaching


